Policy on Advance Directives:

Every adult has the right to an advance directive as a means of voicing his or her wishes for care and treatment at the end of life. Florida law requires that a patient's end-of-life directions, if clearly expressed, should be followed when the person does not have a reasonable medical probability of recovery, has a terminal condition, has an end stage condition or is in a persistent vegetative state.

In Florida there are three kinds of advance directive documents:

- Living Will
- Designated health care surrogate
- Power of Attorney for health care

Surgery Center Policy on Advance Directives:

Because at the surgery center we expect you to recover and be discharged to home after a one-day procedure, the center's policy is to provide resuscitation. Thus, the hospital may be a better choice for care should you wish a "no resuscitation" decision.
